MEMORIAL DAY SPEAKER ASKS LARGE TURNOUT TO HELP TAKE ON THE SUICIDE 'EPIDEMIC' AMONG VETERANS

War by war, U.S. Marine Corps Master Sgt. Clark Budweg shared the number of Americans who have been killed in action as he gave a brief history of the rifle salute at Monday morning's poignant Memorial Day observance.

From the 4,435 Americans who died in the Revolutionary War to the 7,085 who died in the Afghanistan and Iraq wars, he listed off the thought-provoking numbers.

There were the 2,260 who died in the War of 1812, the 1,733 who died in the Mexican-American War, the 140,014 Union deaths and 74,524 Confederate deaths in the Civil War, the 385 who were killed in the Spanish-American War, the 53,402 who died in World War I, the 291,557 in World War II, the 33,629 who died in the Korean War, the 57,939 who died in Vietnam and the 147 who were killed in the Gulf War.

All those lives lost in combat, Budweg said, are what the Memorial Day holiday is supposed

## Cold temps, faulty part push opening day at pool to Friday

Good news is forecast calls for almost perfect pool weather to kick off season

All was quiet at the New Hampton Municipal Pool on Memorial Day, which was supposed to be the kickoff to the swimming season at the facility in Mikkelson Park.

Blame Mother Nature and a faulty part, but if there's good news out of a slightly delayed opening, it is this: The forecast for what will now be opening weekend at the pool is, in a word, perfect.

"We wanted to be fully open on opening day so that was part of it," New Hampton Parks and Recreation Director Tara Hackman said, "and honestly, even without the issues with the slide, it's not safe, in my opinion, to have kids submerged in water that's 65 degrees."

Hackman said the blue slide — the older of the two slides at the pool — has a large crack in

## Ford's lesson: It's easier to talk to strangers

Two students represent New Hampton Middle School well at oratory event in Washington

The reporter had just lobbed a "softball" question to the two New Hampton Middle School eighth-grade students, and both Paige Stumme and Claire Miller couldn't help but smile.

The question: Was it easier to speak in front of their classmates way back in January or at a historic Washington, D.C., theater as part of the Ford's National Oratory Fellowship earlier this month?

"It was way worse in there," Miller said as she pointed to New Hampton Middle School teacher Jason Rude's room. "That was hard; Ford's was fun."

As she talked, her classmate emphatically nodded her head in agreement.

"What she said," Stumme said with a laugh.

But make no mistake about

it, both students say they are incredibly grateful for their school's "Social Justice" program, a cross-curricular program that is led by Rude, a social studies instructor, and English teacher Patrica ten Hoeve.

The trip to Ford's Theatre in the nation's capital certainly didn't hurt.

"My favorite part was definitely meeting a bunch of new people from all over the country," Miller said when asked about the three-day fellowship.

"Yeah, it was cool expanding my horizons from Northeast Iowa," Stumme said. "We got to talk to teacher artists and had little kind of classes, where we worked on improvisation and like how to gain confidence. I learned a lot."

The program led by Rude, a master fellow with the Ford's

to be all about. "I would like you to reflect during the rifle salute and Taps, those numbers have a name, a soul and a story," he said. "Let's not forget them."

Monday's program — held on an absolutely gorgeous Monday morning at the Chickasaw County Veterans Memorial — was typical in some ways. The New Hampton High School Band played, wreaths were laid, speakers spoke, the firing squad fired 21 shots and Taps was played.

American Legion Fae Stine Post 38 Commander Brian Quirk expressed appreciation to those who attended the ceremony, opening the observance by saying "it is extremely heartwarming to see this many people turn out."

The 300 to 350 attendees had a chance to learn about the Purple Heart Tour, a Northeast Iowa-based group that specializes in providing pheasant, turkey and deer hunts to veterans. "These troops have been on the front line," Purple Heart Tour Vice President Jamie Welter said, "and have seen and done things that have lasting effects on their ways of life. As a member of the Purple Heart Tour, we try to be their tip of the spear and offer a way to reconnect to the bonds and brotherhood that they all once shared. We've seen many lost connections that have been reunited at the doorsteps of our hunts."

One of those veterans is retired Lt. Col. Andy Wagner, who served as a special operations officer.

He shared his appreciation

for the services provided by the Purple Heart Tour but also gave those in the crowd an "assignment," if you will.

Wagner talked about the "epidemic going on in our country right now" — the number of veterans who die by suicide each year. Since 2001, Wagner pointed out that about 18 veterans die by suicide each day.

"This is an epidemic that we really need to take a hard look at, and I'm going to task everybody

after this to do a buddy check," he said. "Everyone knows a veteran. See how they're doing."

Wagner said that while American talk a lot about "visible wounds," there are wounds that aren't visible.

"Man, they hurt — extremely bad, just as much or more," Wagner said about depression and post-traumatic stress disorder.

He asked those who care about veterans to be "courageous" and not only check in on their loved ones but also help them get the assistance they need.

"You may know that they're not all right," Wagner said, "and they're going to tell you they're all right. But sometimes, the right thing to do is not the easy thing to do. Get them help — do something, make them aware of it. They may be mad and upset at you, but you know what? It's better than them losing their life."

it, but the replacement part will be installed by the time the pool opens on Friday.

She said the issue is that the "plunge pool" for that slide also contains the water that is used for the splash pad.

"We could have at least opened the pad, but people don't get that the plunge pool and the splash pad are directly connected," Hackman said. "Again, it's disappointing, but it's also just a few days and the new opening looks a lot more favorable when it comes to the weather."

Hackman said pool employees have been battling what has been a relatively cool couple of weeks.

"Highs in the 60s and lows in the 40s," she said, "even with the heaters on makes it really hard to warm up the water. And every time we have to add new water, we're going through the same deal."

But by Friday, highs are expected to be in the upper 70s and the weekend, if the forecast holds, will provide almost perfect early-season swimming weather — with sunny skies and high temperatures in the 80s.

"It's always a hard decision to

delay opening," Hackman said, "but I feel comfortable we made the right decision. We're looking forward to a great opening day and weekend."

The pool will have regular

hours — adult swim from noon to 1:30 p.m. and open swimming from 1:30 to 7 p.m. — and weekend hours this year at the facility will be from noon to 5 p.m.

Ascension Day reminds us the importance of humility, gentleness, unity, love

There are times and events in life, some more than others, that usually have a tendency to put many things into perspective.

I think that many of us can get lost in focusing all of our attention and time on details and losing sight of the bigger picture or the bigger meaning.

One example is when I was the celebrant for a wedding in Petersburg. One of the parents was adamant that the bride and groom come down at the sign of peace to all of the family members but that was not what the couple wanted.

The parent was becoming belligerent and the wedding couple were quite upset.

I took the couple into the sacristy and told them to remember that hardly anything in life goes exactly as planned.

The thing to keep in

mind was that, at the end of the wedding Mass they would be married and begin their new life together, sealed in the love of Jesus Christ.

I had a couple of these "perspective" moments in the past few years. When I was stationed in Dubuque a person had asked to talk with me. I was told that, many years ago, a priest had told this person that he was in a sinful and unlawful marriage since they were not married in the church and his wife had previously been divorced.

Tears started to flow and he said that he missed the church and the sacraments, that he felt his life was incomplete without them.

A second moment was when I received word that a tragic event had occurred — a teenage driver, who was texting while driving, hit and killed a young father of two while he was riding


his bicycle.

Both of these events occurred within the same week and that old perspective machine went into overdrive.

Today we celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. Luke tells us, in the first reading, that Jesus' disciples stood there, watching Jesus ascend and kept looking at the sky.

The men dressed in white say to the disciples, "This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return in the same way as you have seen him going into heaven."

And with that, the disciples go forth and begin to preach everywhere, going out with the big picture perspective of bringing the Good News to every creature. The command that Jesus gave to those disciples, and to us on that day of his Ascension, was to proclaim the Gospel to every

None of the Gospels tell us that the disciples formed a committee to go over all of the details. We're told at the end of the Gospel of Mark that "...they went forth and preached everywhere."


The Good News of Jesus is the big picture, the Good News that Paul says is: humility, gentleness, unity and love.

A dilapidated home in the 300 block of South Chestnut has been torn down to make way for a new three-bedroom manufactured home as part of a New Hampton Industrial Development Corporation effort to increase affordable housing stock in the city.

program, and ten Hoeve begins each year with eighth-graders choosing topics meaningful for them and preparing speeches on the issue. They then deliver those speeches to their classmates. Some of the best speeches "advance" to the school's annual "Oratory Night," where this year, students earned trips to either Kansas City for a regional fellowship or Washington for the national fellowship.

Stumme's "Right to Repair" speech dealt with the issue of big companies not making parts inclusive for smaller businesses while Miller's "The Deadly Cost of Life" took on the issue of skyrocketing insulin prices.

"I know friends and people who have diabetes," Miller said. "One of my friends recently got diagnosed with it and so I thought about that and how important it was to make sure people can get the insulin they need."

"I was talking with my family and we own Marv and Zip's, which is a small business repair [shop]," Stumme said, "and they're like, 'Yeah, you should do that because it's affecting our business.' I thought that would be kind of cool to do. It would be different — no one's ever done it before."

They did well enough to earn trips with Rude to D.C. and the theater where President Abraham Lincoln was shot and killed by John Wilkes Boothe just days after the Civil War came to an end.

They arrived in Washington on Friday, May 2 and spent a whirlwind three days in the nation's capital taking part in a number of workshops and delivering their speeches both at the Washington Monument and at Ford's Theatre.

"Surprisingly, I didn't have many nerves," Stumme said. "It was way more fun than doing it in front of our classmates, I can tell you that."

"I was a little nervous," Miller said, "but there was a lot of excitement. I mean Ford's is a really cool place so it was hard not to get pumped up for that."

Rude said he is honored to be part of the Ford's program, one that he believes benefits all students.

"This program is about the work of the

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
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# Chickasaws bow out in NFV rematch

The New Hampton girls soccer team came up just short in its quest to take on top-ranked Denver in a Class 1A, Region 1 quarterfinal last week Wednesday in West Union against the host North Fayette Valley TigerHawks.

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



## New Hampton coach says he likes team's willingness to play hard for one another

Cory McDonald cannot predict the future and he's definitely not a fortune teller.

There is no crystal ball that sits in his team's dugout, although that would come in handy this summer during tight spots out on the diamond if such a prop actually worked.

What McDonald can tell you is that his perennial power Chickasaw nine are going to find themselves in jams this year. But the key championship trait of a lot of his past New Hampton squads has been how they respond to those challenges. That grit and resilience could well define another potential run toward the top for this Northeast Iowa team that has big goals yet again, as well they should.

Ranked No. 9 to start the

season, New Hampton is clearly on the state's radar as one of the better programs in Class 2A.

McDonald's Chickasaws have proved their worth in the latter stages of May by rolling over the out-gunned competition en route to a perfect 4-0 mark. New Hampton has outscored its opponents by a tally of 40-11 after what essentially amounted to the first week of the regular season being put in the books.

Not too shabby. "It's a good start. It doesn't get any better than undefeated," said McDonald. "It's definitely a strong start to our season."

New Hampton seems to be carrying over last season's momentum — although each and every season is separate unto itself — into the year 2025.

The Chickasaws raced all the way to the 2A title game last year and although key components from that state title

runner-up squad were lost to graduation — several key pieces remain.

Throw in the mix a horde of up-and-coming talent and it's easy to see why McDonald is bullish on his squad that put the hammer down on the Bearcats of North Butler on Monday.

This was a knockout punch delivered by the Chickasaws from the opening bell as New Hampton kept the host Bearcats (1-1) on the ropes with eight runs in the first frame and ended this one early in five innings by a score of 15-1. The top half of the opening stanza lasted 30-plus minutes as New Hampton applied pressure on the base paths and never let up.

Add a much-improved Braxton Bundy into the equation on the hill and it was easy to see how this one got away from the underdog Bearcats, who managed three hits. Bundy, a junior lefty, struck out the side in inning number one in his first career varsity start and finished with seven strikeouts over three innings. He's added pop to his fastball, which features movement. His arsenal also features a lively curve ball and his plethora of quality pitches could be a serious problem for batters in the box should he continue to find his groove on the hill.

"Braxton has improved greatly from last season. He showed that tonight in his first varsity start," said McDonald. "He was on point with all of his

pitches."

McDonald fully understands the dog days of summer will require him to watch his pitching staff closely, but he's got plenty of arms to worry about and that's a good thing — because all of them bring a little something different to the table.

McDonald utilized all-stater Jaxon Eckley on the hill for six innings of a 2-0 shutout at Starmont last Friday. He's a senior now and will also man third base like he did a year ago. NH plated its two runs in the sixth, highlighted by an RBI single courtesy of senior Reid Rausch.

It was senior Landon Marr that started the season opener versus Clayton Ridge — a 15-5 blowout victory — last week Thursday. He toiled four innings and despite giving up five runs on the mound, seems to have added a little more giddy-up to his fastball as well.

Eckley collected three hits versus the Eagles, including a double.

NH junior Caden Rochford worked four innings in an 8-5 triumph over Riceville on Saturday.

"We are very deep with our pitching staff," said the NH head coach, now in his 17th season at the helm of the Chickasaws.

The run support by the Chickasaws on Monday in Allison on the Bearcats' home diamond could come in handy later on down the road.

"It's important for us to have this kind of game tonight on Monday because we've got a really busy week at the end of the week. With pitch counts — strategically — for us to have an offensive barrage and for our pitchers to shut them down and get a five-inning game in is really important for us as far as looking ahead to the end of the week," said McDonald.

Chickasaw senior infielder Colton Ashley doubled in the North Butler win and also made a terrific play on a high-hopping grounder in the hole near second base late in the game.

New Hampton also has the luxury of Charles City transfer Carter Cajthaml, a sophomore that was an all-conference catcher for the Comets last summer. Cajthaml also pitches and can wreak havoc out on the base paths, as do almost all of McDonald's players as New Hampton is consistently near the top of its class in terms of total stolen bases.

Cajthaml knocked in two runs with a single against North Butler and sophomore Jay Pickar collected three RBI versus the Bearcats.

It's still early, but McDonald talked about the winning characteristic that not only he sees in his 2025 Chickasaw squad, but his opponents as well.

"The biggest thing about this year's team. Another opposing coach has noted and said to me. He said this and it's true.

He said 'your kids play hard for each other,'" said McDonald.

McDonald elaborated on that point.

"What's the most important thing? That is it. Win or lose — we'll do both this year, of course. No one goes undefeated. Win or lose, we know that we have a group that's going to play hard for each other and because of that we always have a chance in every game," said McDonald.

New Hampton hosts Charles City in the NEIC opener at Mikkelson Park tonight (Thursday) in a doubleheader that's slated to start at 5 p.m. The Chickasaws play at North Fayette Valley on Friday and tangle with area squad Turkey Valley in another twinbill on Saturday with a first pitch of 9 a.m.

# Freshman says state 'really cool experience'

But Laures knew there was a lot more left in the gas tank that he knows he can tap into later on down the road.

Laures actually cleared the height that won eighth place, but finished a little lower because of misses on earlier heights.

With pressure mounting, he came up big and cleared two heights on his last attempt.

"That's a testament to his competitiveness and adjusting on the fly. Carson is a pretty calm and cool competitor, and wasn't afraid of anyone he ran or jumped against all year long," said NH boys track coach Scott Jenkins.

"When you're inside Drake Stadium as a competitor for the first time, it's easy to get distracted by the crowd, other competitors, and the enormity of it all. Carson clearing those two heights not only showed him that he belonged down there, it also helped give him confidence for the rest of the day and his future trips down there," Jenkins added.

This is just the beginning for the determined and humble Chickasaw that has lofty goals and records that he wants to break at his alma mater before his track and field career is complete.

Give him some time, because there's a good chance those all-time marks at NH will fall.

"I wanted to break 56 to get the record, but I'm not quite there," said Laures about his run around the oval in the 400 hurdles, which clocked out at 57.27.

Just in case you're curious, the school record in the 400 hurdles for boys competition is held by David Nielsen (56.12, 1993).

"I came in here expecting more than what I actually achieved, but this is just like a test run," said Laures. "I'm going up against a lot of other seniors who are really fast. I can compete with them, so now next year I know what I can do and I know what I have to do to get it."

Juniors and seniors often dominate high school athletics in the sport of track and field, but there are rare occasions when a freshman can steal an upperclassmen's thunder in the most important meet of the season.

Laures managed to do just that, but the biggest gift he can pull out of this state meet is just being there, because he was in select company.

"It's a really cool experience just to be down here," said Laures. "I'm really thankful for that. I couldn't really ask for more to be down here. That was the ultimate goal at the beginning of the season. We achieved that. It's one of the best envi-

ronments that you can be in as a high school athlete."

The other freshman competing in the 400 hurdles in Class 2A was Owen Praisner of Aplington-Parkersburg, who finished 11th overall in 56.34. All but five competitors in the event were either juniors or seniors.

"Carson was clutch for us all season, and he really showed that at the state qualifying meet and at state. As I've said before, no moment or competitor was too big for Carson to handle all season long, and you don't see that type of presence often in freshmen," said Jenkins.

While Laures wasn't quite satisfied with his hurdles race, he'll take his 14th-place leap in the high jump.

"I was hoping I could get a little higher," said Laures. "Six-one — I've hit that before. I know I can get higher."

The record to beat at New Hampton is 6-4 and held by Laures' distant cousin — Craig Laures, a 1992 NHHS grad. Mike Jenn also hit that mark clear back in 1977.

Carter Sells of Shenandoah was the other freshman competing in the 2A high jump and did not register a successful leap.

If you watch Laures perform at any track meet — you'll often see him keenly watching other events when he's not out competing himself. He's studying, learning and picking up on things that may be the difference between first and second.

He watched an all-time Iowa great — Western Dubuque junior Quentin Nauman — do something Friday morning that's never been done on the prep level in Iowa with a 1:47 clip in the 800-meter race. Then the Oregon commit did it again on Saturday by wowing the fans with Iowa's first ever sub-four-minute mile and breaking the 1:50 minute mark in the open 800.

Laures — like anyone that witnessed that greatness — was impressed.

"I'm here competing and then I'm also just taking it all in," said Laures. "I've noticed a lot of other people taking it all in, too. This could be their last time, this could be their first time."

It's a safe bet to say this won't be Laures' last trip down to Ole' "Big Blue."

"Carson is a true student of track, knowing a lot of names along with history and great times/heights/distances for a lot of events," said Jenkins. "At the end of the day, just being down there on the track, see the competition there, and soak everything in will only help him in the years to come. He should not be disappointed with anything that happened at state, because he will only be better for everything he learned."



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

The kids hung out in the gym while Staker, Mason City Newman coach Gary Nyhus and I went to Nyhus' classroom. Gary pulled out a deck of cards and said, "How about a little blackjack?"

So for about 35 minutes, two legendary coaches and I played the game, and by the time the rain let up, I was the big winner and coach Staker owed me 20 bucks.

Almost 20 years later, at my first Dairy Days, I turned the corner and ran into coach Staker, who by then had moved on to lead a resurgent Coe College football program.

"Fenske, how the heck are you," he asked.

"I'm doing well, but don't you owe me 20 bucks?"

He laughed and gave me a mischievous smile before saying, "Hey, I'm good for it."

Fast forward to that evening, when my boys — then just 11 and 10 — and I headed back to Fredericksburg for the Dairy Days' evening parade. I shot a bunch of pictures, and about half-way through the parade, Josh came running across the street with a hot dog and a Coke.

"What's that," I said.

"Some old guy gave it to me and told me to tell you, 'Now, we're even,'" Josh replied.

Over the years, I loved telling coach Staker that story, and he always laughed.

"You're not raising a dummy," he would say with a laugh,

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

## Dairy checkoff helps promote the dairy industry

The dairy checkoff was created by farmers for farmers, and Midwest Dairy is still 100% funded by dairy farmers today.

Dairy farmers are required to contribute 15 cents per hundredweight of milk sold to the dairy checkoff. Of this, 10 cents are used by the local dairy checkoff, Midwest Dairy, and 5 cents are used by the national dairy checkoff, Dairy Management Incorporated.

Midwest Dairy covers 9 1/2 states throughout the Midwest and is responsible for handling local dairy checkoff within this region.

Midwest Dairy is governed by 127 board members at eight local, or quasi-governmental organizations. Ultimately, a 34-membered Corporate Board consisting of dairy farmers is selected to guide Midwest Dairy.

Can only be used for:

- Consumer education
- Promotion of dairy for human consumption
- Nutrition, product, food safety and consumer research
- Cannot conduct research to increase on-farm or processing productivity.
- Cannot influence government and legislature.
- USDA provides oversight of the dairy checkoff.

An individual's involvement within the Iowa State Dairy Association is voluntary. Individuals, or organizations, can choose to become either a Corporate, Producer or Associate Member.





## Chickasaws battle but come up short in soccer playoff opener

New Hampton's first-round loss in the Class 2A substate tournament pretty much was a microcosm for the Chickasaws' season.

Close but no cigar. The Chickasaws opened and closed the postseason with a 3-1 road loss to Independence, marking the seventh time this season New Hampton had lost either a one-score or two-score tilt.

"It is frustrating on one hand, but on the other, our boys played really well and as much as we wanted to win, there's no question in my mind that we are a way, way better team now than we were at the start of the season," New Hampton coach Jeff Monteith said. "We were either really close in a lot of games or maybe we did get blown out a few times but we were still competing hard."

"A lot of 1-15 teams just throw in the towel; our guys didn't." Against Independence, New Hampton took an early 1-0 lead when Jay Pickar found the back of the net thanks to an assist from Kevyn Torres.

"It was a nice play because Kevyn just chipped it over the top to Jay and Jay got the goal," Monteith said. "We didn't have

a lot of offense — that's obviously been an issue for us — but we were moving the ball the best we had all season."

The Mustangs, though, responded, scored two goals to take a 2-1 halftime lead and added an insurance goal in the second half to advance to the substate semifinal game against Cedar Rapids Xavier on Tuesday.

Goalkeeper Easton Monteith had 16 saves to run his season total to 313, tops in Class 2A. The junior also leads the state in save percentage at 79.3.

His dad and coach, meanwhile, said the key for New Hampton in 2026 will be to find more offense.

"We spent a lot of time on the defensive end of the field this year," Jeff Monteith said, "but at the same time, with the little depth we had, I'm proud of our guys. They hung in there. They never quit."

The game marked the final one for three seniors — Manny Guevara, Xander Meyerhoff and Jarrin Robinson — and at the very least, Meyerhoff, who was injured during the final week of the regular season was able to end his prep career on the pitch.

"He played, but yeah, he wasn't close to 100 percent," Monteith said. "Give him credit. There's no way he wasn't going to play in the playoffs."

Because New Hampton ran in the morning/early afternoon session on Friday, those alternates not only had a chance to get on the track for a warm-up but also got to experience what legendary track announcer Mike Jay calls the "best high

do that down there." The Turkey Valley school record (4:18.48) in the dmed is held by the 2021 quartet of Kara Reicks, Josie Weber, Jaycie Byrne and Jalyssa Blazek. That relay pairing placed fifth that year at state.

Bakula changed the order of the relay prior to state to help Nieman qualify for the open 400. Nieman switched places with Kuennen, who led off the relay at state and Nieman took the baton in the third position.

The Trojans' 4x400 relay of Kuennen, Stika, freshman Alexis Gruenberg and Nieman ran to a 17th-place finish in 4:14.66 (season-best) as dark clouds started to envelop the stadium late in the evening. Sprinkles found their way down to the field turf and oval that comprise the stadium, which is home to the Drake Bulldogs.

TV's two events on Saturday were the sprint medley and Stika's open 800.

The sprint med was the first race of the day as the Trojans were in heat one. The group of Kuennen, junior Jordan

Thronson, Nieman and Stika wound up 21st in 1:56.37.

Stika's individual event about an hour-and-a-half later did not go as planned. She ended up



falling down after getting tangled up with other runners at the 300-meter mark of the race. "She unfortunately got caught up in a little bit of traffic

and a little bit of pushing," said Bakula. "She ended up tripping and basically falling over. She got up and she finished, which says a lot about not quitting. She could easily just said, 'I'm done.'"

Stika ran to a clip of 2:32.72, which put her in the 24th and final slot in the field. Bakula talked about Stika's race — which she called a learning experience.

"We haven't had that many people in a race before, let alone that close in time having to deal with," said Bakula. "She ran well. She fought the finish. She ran tough. I have no doubt that Bella would have run a PR in her 800 if she would have not got caught up in that."

There were memorable state moments created for this TV bunch that will look to get back to Des Moines in 2026. That's motivation alone to want to get better and perhaps snare a medal next spring.

"For the next three years that feeds into their fire of wanting more and wanting to go back and be that experienced person on that stage next year," said Bakula about her young squad.

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## Chickasaw girls cruise back to state tourney

It's a team effort as New Hampton wins final round regional by 33 shots

Not that it wasn't expected, but the members of the New Hampton girls golf team "family" get to stay together for one more tournament.

That's because the Chickasaws blitzed the field last Wednesday at the Class 2A final round regional tournament at Rice Lake Golf Club to earn yet another trip to the state tournament.

New Hampton made sure it didn't end last week with a solid final round regional.



## Turkey Valley gets taste of state track

Distance medley relay's 11th-place finish highlights Trojans' work in Des Moines

Experience down at the state meet in Des Moines is priceless.

Bottom line — it's tough squaring off against 18-year-old seniors who often dominate the field on the high school level.

That's what makes Turkey Valley's run at the Class 1A state meet this spring so exciting.

Bringing a roster to Drake Stadium with mostly freshmen and sophomores, the Trojans demonstrated they may be a serious force to be reckoned with if they keep improving and stay dedicated to the sport.

"I thought it was a very successful weekend," said TV coach Sarah Bakula. "Dalton and I were very pleased with how everything played out."

Bakula, who is co-head coach along with Hackman, qualified five events (three relays) that attempted to make their mark at the state blue oval this past week.

TV started out its 2025 state track experience with sophomore Hazel Nieman's 19th-place finish in the open 400 with a clip of 1:02.47 on Thursday evening.

"She ran well. She ran right where she'd been running towards the end of the year," said Bakula. "You really couldn't have asked for very much more. She started the weekend off on a great note to kind of get us rolling."

Then it was a season PR accomplished by the distance medley group of sophomores Kendall Kuennen, Bella Stika, Nieman and freshman Brynlee Hayek on Friday morning. The foursome ran a season-best by over three seconds of 4:22.46. Stika's anchor leg — which was leading the Trojans' heat two at one point — was 2:22.

"Everyone that ran that race basically ran their PR, which obviously led to a three-second overall PR for that crew," said Bakula. "That was awesome to have a relay

## Distance medley highlights state for Chickasaw girls

Coach lauds New Hampton's 'collective effort' that leads to season-best time at the Class 2A state track meet

It wasn't just one girl who made it a memorable distance medley relay run for the New Hampton girls track team at the Class 2A state meet.

It was all of them. Madi Shawver to Aleigha Cahoy to Capri Lester to Taylor Ries gave the Chickasaws their state highlight as they ran to a season-best time on Friday. And while it netted the Chickasaws' just a 17th-place finish, New Hampton coach Jeanette Laures was more than happy to take that time of 4:21.67.

"What I loved about it the most was it was a collective effort," Laures said, "and the d-med, it was obviously our highlight at state. Madi and Aleigha were faster, Capri cut like a second off in her [400]

and Taylor ran the best 800 she's ever run. How can you not be happy?"

The Chickasaws came into the state seeded 19th, and they cut more than six seconds off the time they ran at the state qualifying meet the week before.

But in a meet that was, in a word, fast, the herculean effort capped off by a 2:23 800 split by Ries moved them up just two spots. Four years ago, New Hampton ran a 4:24.44 distance medley and just missed medaling with a ninth-place finish.

"It shows you how fast it was," Laures said. "I mean we ran a 4:24 and get ninth then and we run a 4:21 and we're 17th? That tells you something right there."
