# **New Hampton** says 'no' to the Upper Iowa

School Board votes to reject invitation, wants to give NEIC chance to expand

The New Hampton School Board Monday night sent a strong message that it wants to keep the Northeast Iowa Conference alive when it voted unanimously to reject an invitation to join the Upper Iowa Conference.

"I think this will show people that we're serious about trying to fix this thing," said Board Member Bob Ayers after he made the motion to turn down the UIC invitation and revisit the conference situation

Earlier this year, New Hampton was among o schools, including fellow NEIC members Waukon and Crestwood, to receive invitations into the nine-team UIC, a conference that includes Turkey Valley, where Jurrens also serves as superintendent.

In March, the New Hampton School Board directed Jay Jurrens to make the resolution to remove Waverly-Shell Rock from the NEIC, citing the fact that the conference's largest school had simply outgrown the conference.

Last month, superintendents voted 5-1 to remove the Go-Hawks from the league, five of the school boards agreed and superintendents then again voted 5-1 to remove Waverly-Shell Rock from the conference, beginning with the 2023-24 school year.

The NEIC then sent invitations to Oelwein, Osage, North Fayette Valley, MFL-Mar-Mac and Sumner-Fredericksburg, but on Monday night, Jurrens said that only Osage is "the only one in play right now," but it was far from a guarantee

# County leaders give green light to jail feasibility study

Supervisors will use \$20,000 in ARPA funds to learn about their options with aging facility

The Chickasaw County Board of Supervisors moved ahead Monday with a feasibility study on the county's jail when the board agreed to hire the Samuels Group to look at the facility's needs.

The action came on the same day that the board approved raising jail fees for inmates who are serving sentences at the jail that was built in the 1950s.


The county will use \$20,000 of its American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to pay for the feasibility study that will

give the Sheriff's Office a variety of options when it comes to the jail. Those options could range from building a new jail, turning the current jail into a 24-hour holding facility and housing other inmates in other county jails, the possibility of having a joint law-enforcement center with the New Hampton Police and more. The New Hampton City

Council last month agreed to contribute \$5,000 of its ARPA funds to the study.



#### Area farmers finally catch a weather break

percentage of corn planted jump from 5 percent to 41 percent, and ISU Extension Agronomist Terry Basol said he believes that number might be closer to 60 to 70 percent after a busy weekend for farmers.

"We were able to take off and really get going," he said on Tuesday afternoon, "and I know we had a lot of grateful farmers when it came to Mother Nature. Once planting got going, I mean it really got going.

And while planting slowed Tuesday because of the rain showers that hit the area, Basol said that for the crop all ready in the field, the rainfall that was around one-half inch of rain was perfect.

"It was a nice, timely rain," he said, "and as long as we don't have four or five days of this, it's going to be really good."

Growers were also able to start planting soybean fields around the state as the percentage of soybeans planted jumped from 7 percent to 34 percent.

"As slow as we started," Basol said, "I know there are a lot of guys who took deep sighs of relief last week. With the planters we have these days, we can make up a lot of time pretty quickly, and we saw that last week, this weekend and even Monday.

More heat and rain is forecast for today (Thursday) and tonight. The high today is expected to climb into the 80s, and storms, some of which could tend to be on the severe side, may pop up.

Those storms will be followed by a cool front and highs this weekend won't make it out of the 50s.

Still, Basol said farmers badly needed last week.

"From where we were a couple of weeks ago, we're looking a lot better," he said. "Two weeks ago, we may not have been panicking, but we were starting to get really worried. Today, we still want to get the crop in obviously, but we've made a lot of progress over the last 10 days."

# SafeTech presents county leaders with EMS options

Board of Supervisors requested that the council do the study to find out more about the EMS needs of the county and also to consider if a publicly-owned ambulance service was a realis-

As they did at a public meet-

ing in March, the SafeTech consultants said Tuesday there were three phases to the study. The first phase included interviews with various county and city leaders, EMS personnel and other stakeholders, as well as the gathering of data.

The second phase was Tuesday night's presentation, and Fennell said the third phase will come after leaders decide which model they want to pursue. That's when SafeTech will help the county institute the

owned through what SafeTech calls a "joint powers agreement" or "ambulance district," which in essence would be the public option.

 Have MercyOne New Hampton Medical Center choose to provide the service, even though the hospital's CEO and president, Aaron Flugum, has said repeatedly in the past that the hospital doesn't have the resources to develop and run an ambulance service.

Fennell and Huber freely admitted that all four models had plusses and minuses, but they also urged both the Ambulance Council and the Board of Supervisors to try to come up with an EMS plan for the county that was reliable, viable and sustainable.

They said that based on the numbers they were able to gather, a publicly-owned ambulance service would need about \$1.725 million for start-up costs that included three new ambulance rigs and a 3,000-square foot building. Yet, they also said that it would be virtually impossible for the county to purchase three new ambulances and have them delivered by Jan. 1, 2023. Their report showed that a

publicly-owned service would be more than \$625,000 in the red during its first year of operation, and even if the current annualized subsidy of \$294,000 is used, it would still suffer a loss of more than \$331,000.

"But it's not apples to apples, MercyOne's Flugum said after the meeting, "because the staffing levels they're proposing aren't what we have now."

Flugum said he felt that the staffing levels proposed by SafeTech might be "pie in the sky" and that there would be ways to reduce costs.

The consultants, though, said that all the models — including working together with the current ambulance provider — may lead to a higher subsidy.

The consultants also said that under any model they were proposing, the ambulances should be housed in New Hampton because even the larger small towns in the county like Nashua and Fredericksburg simply didn't have the call volume to support housing an ambulance; in fact, in response to one question, Huber said Fredericksburg's total number of calls was just one-eighth the number needed to house a rig.

One Ambulance Council member expressed disappointment in the report.

"I think all of us here have at one time or another considered all four of these options," Fredericksburg Mayor Jimmy Mitchell said. "I was hoping for more direction."



# Ascension Day 2022

Christians believe just as Jesus went into heaven, so will they

The Christian holiday of Ascension Day, also known as the Feast of the Ascension. celebrates when Jesus ascended to heaven.

This feast day is one of the ecumenical feasts of Christian churches, along with the celebrations of the Passion, Easter,

Ascension Day is always observed on a Thursday, the 40th day after Easter.

"No one has ascended into heaven except he who descended from heaven, the Son of Man." ~ John 3:13

#### **Ascension Day 2022**

This year, Ascension Day will be on Thursday, May 26.

#### Jesus' Ascension in Scripture

Forty days from the day He rose from the grave, Jesus ascended into heaven. Here is how Luke described the event:

Therefore, when they [the disciples and the risen Christ] had come together, they asked Him saying, "Lord, will You at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?"

And He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has put in His own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and to the end of the earth.

'Now when he had spoken these things, while they watched, He was taken up and a cloud received Him out of their sight...' (Acts 1:4-9, New King James Version).

#### **Traditions of Ascension Day**

Because the date of Easter varies from year to year, the celebration of the Ascension moves with it. It always falls on the fortieth day from Easter and, since Easter always falls on a Sunday, Ascension Day always falls on a Thursday; it is frequently called "Holy Thursday.

Ascension Day celebrates Christ's exaltation. While on earth, He was a servant. Now in heaven, He is the ruler and Lord of all. By entering heaven as the representative of mankind, He completed the work of our salvation and guarantees the eventual glorification of all who love Him.

Just as Jesus went up in the clouds, He will return the same way. Again Luke described the scene:

"And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as He went up, behold two men stood by them in white apparel, who also said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven."

#### The Importance of Jesus' Ascension

1. The ascended and enthroned Christ pours out his Spirit on the church.

Jesus himself had told his disciples that it was good for him to go away, because only then would he send them another Helper, the Spirit of truth (John 16:7-16). And that's exactly what happened on the Day of Pentecost, ten days after Jesus' ascension. The Spirit descended on the church with power, inaugurating a new age in the history of salvation.

That's why Peter connects Jesus' exaltation and the outpouring of the Spirit in

Being, therefore, exalted at the right hand of God, and having received from the Father the promise of the Holy Spirit, he has poured out this that you yourselves are seeing and hearing.

2. The ascended and enthroned Christ applies the blessings of salvation.

Having accomplished redemption through his suffering on the cross, the risen and exalted Christ now applies the salvation he has won, by granting the gifts of repentance and forgiveness of sins.

As Peter says in Acts 5:31:

God exalted him at his right hand as Leader and Savior, to give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins.

3. The ascended and enthroned Christ cares for his suffering people as they bear witness to him.

We see this in Acts 7 when Stephen becomes the first martyr of the Christian church.

But he, full of the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. And he said, "Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God." (Acts 7:55-56)

All of this should give us great encouragement! When feeling weak in ourselves, Luke reminds us that the exalted Christ has given us his Spirit, who equips us with the power, boldness, and courage we need to accomplish our mission.

This is the great hope of all Christians. For just as Jesus went into heaven, so will

Those who are dead will rise first; those who are living will be caught up to meet Him in the air, according to Paul, writing to the church at Thessalonica. With this hope in mind, Christians sometimes conclude their meetings with the words, "Come Lord Jesus."

# Career change has been good for intern funeral director

Former teacher says new job is in some ways like his old one

Anthony Hable knows the look — you went from this to that? — by heart, but the funeral director intern has an answer for those who wonder how an elementary school teacher suddenly changes careers and works at a funeral home.

"It's still about relationships, it's still about communication, it's still about organizational skills," he said during an interview in his office at Hugeback-Johnson Funeral Home in New Hampton. "You had to have those to be a third-grade teacher, you need to have those here."

Hable began his journey a little more than a year ago -Dec. 23, 2020, to be exact when he sat down with his good friend and fellow Chickasaw Wrestling Club coach Andy Hugeback.

We knew we needed more help here," Hugeback said, "and I knew Anthony was a hard worker who could be trusted and I knew he was really good with people. Those are important qualities for a funeral direc-

Hable graduated Decorah High School in 2010 and attended the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse and Upper Iowa University — wrestling at both schools — before receiving a degree in elementary education from UIU.

He then took a job at Fredericksburg, and for four seasons - from 2017 to 2020 he was an assistant baseball coach at New Hampton. He said he wasn't necessarily looking to get out of education, but the chance to become a funeral director was too good of an opportunity to pass up.

# Chickasaw girls advance in golf

New Hampton fires season-low 352 to win first round of 2A regional

The New Hampton girls golf team will look to tame that wide-open, back-nine at Bear Creek Golf Course in Forest City on Wednesday.

The nickname for the Class 2A regional state-qualifying 18-hole course might seem intimidating, but these Chickasaws have taken down formidable foes before.

"It's a little different. You gotta kind of put yourself in the right positions on the back to score well. There's a lot of trouble," said NH head coach Eric Olson. "You gotta hit over water a lot. It's really tight and there's some long holes. Just about every hole has some kind of hazard on it. It's kind of like our golf course, except it's a little tighter."

After last Friday's opening round 352 at the Belmond Country Club in the start to regional play, New Hampton will head into Forest City with a ton of momentum. That mark was a season-low for the Chickasaws, who are ranked No. 1 by the Iowa High School Golf Coaches Association and finished third at the state meet

'It was just a really solid day for us," said Olson. "Everything was clicking on all cylinders. We kind of had our confidence back after our little hiccup on Monday at the conference meet. We just got to carry that into Wednesday," said Olson. New Hampton is vying to

crack the state field for the fifth-consecutive season under the direction of Olson. If New Hampton is planning on playing at state next week in Cedar Falls, it will have to do what it's done almost all season - fire low rounds. "Collectively, it was probably

our best day of chipping and putting," said Olson about the start to regional play.

The Chickasaws, spearheaded by a 1-2-3 individual

#### Chickasaw girls qualify for 10 events at state

Carlee Rochford stood near the long jump pit where she had just broken a 42-year-old New Hampton school record and brushed her arms off.

"On a day like this, the sand just sticks to you," she said with a laugh. "Trust me, the shower is going to feel really good tonight, but all this sand is worth it. This has been a goal of mine for a really long time."

The fact that record-breaking leap of 17 feet, 10 inches came at the Class 2A state qualifying meet made it even better as she not only broke the 17-9 mark that Peg Ganske recorded back in 1980 but it put her in the top flight at the Class 2A state meet that begins today (Thursday) in Des Moines.

"The No. 1 goal obviously is to qualify," Rochford said, "but you also want to get in that second flight with the better jumpers because they push you.'

Not that Rochford needs all that much pushing as the Chickasaw junior had herself a heck of a day at a meet that New Hampton came within one lousy point of claiming a team title. Before winning the long jump, she claimed the high jump title with a leap of 5-4, and later in the meet, she won the 100 hurdles and ran a leg on the Chickasaws' 4x400 relay that also included Taylor Ries, Kinsley Hackman and Hailee

When the meet had ended, though, those were the lone four events that New Hampton was assured of taking to state. The Chickasaws then had to play the waiting game — one that lasted longer than usual because two 2A state qualifying meets had been postponed because of severe thunderstorms and weren't run until Friday — to see what else they were taking to Des Moines this weekend.

The top-two finishers at each state qualifying meet punch their tickets to state, and the remaining eight spots are filled by the next eight fastest times and farthest distances from

"We don't have to go tonight," Noah told me, "because the new music teacher, what's her name, told



But this Class of 2022, small by New Hampton standards, has persevered and brought folks like me so much joy




